Superintendent's Message

It's hard to believe that the end of this school year is here! It's been another great year for the Neenah Joint School District. As a District, we have a great deal to celebrate. Highlights of our progress and advancements made are identified in our four District focus areas: Communications, Curriculum-Instruction-Assessment, Supervision and Evaluation, and Resources.

Communications – Two accomplishments in this area include the development of a **District Communications Plan** as well as the hiring of **Mr. Jim Strick** as our Communications Manager.

Curriculum-Instruction-Assessment – We have made significant strides in this area as we continue to assess and monitor student academic achievements.

- 1. This year was the first year that the Department of Public Instruction provided a score for individual schools. Three of our schools received "Significantly Exceeds Expectations," six schools were identified as "Exceeds Expectations," and three schools were recognized as "Meets Expectations." This is a great accomplishment for our District and something we can hang our hat on!
- 2. Aligned with high student achievement, Hoover Elementary School was awarded the Wisconsin School of Excellence Award. Additionally, Roosevelt & Alliance Charter were both named with Wisconsin Title I High-Achieving and High-Progress School Awards!
- 3. We continue to produce some of the highest academic scores in the area for students taking and passing the Advanced Placement (AP) exams. For the second year in a row, we received the AP District of the Year Award. Furthermore, our ACT scores remain the highest among districts in the Fox Valley area.

Supervision and Evaluation – We have now engaged the **Effectiveness Project** for all certified staff members. This was a change in our previous approach for professional staff evaluations. Our goal is to develop **solid, objective measures assuring effective professionals** in all schools and classrooms. Although on the surface this may seem simple, there are many factors to consider in any evaluation process. We want the highest quality professionals to be with our students...and our goal is to **compensate them accordingly.**

Resources – LONG-TERM DEBT HAS (almost) DISAPPEARED! We have one more payment of \$250,000 and four payments of \$50,000 (interest free) until **all long-term debt is gone.** We have been faced with several challenges this year as we review and monitor our spending in all budget areas. Along with our continued commitment to academic learning and placing resources in spots that benefit our students the most, we are, unfortunately, dealing with legal issues regarding old contracts.

Our families and taxpayers can rest assured that we are carefully monitoring this process, along with our resources, with vigilance and a high priority to maintaining our District reputation for academic excellence. Your **Board of Education**, along with the **administrative team**, has made a commitment to **fiscal responsibility** and **high academic achievement**.

Neenah Proceeds with 2013-14 Budget - A Framework is Developed Despite Uncertainty Over State Funding



AREAS OF FOCUS

Although the ink has barely dried on the 2012-13 budget document, planning is well under way for the 2013-14 Neenah Joint School District budget.

As is often the case, District leaders are waiting for events in Madison and Washington, D.C. to unfold before finalizing large portions of the 2013-14 budget. Uncertainty over state funding (revenue limit, equalization aid) and what effect, if any, the federal sequestration may have on public school finances are two reasons why the District cannot execute a comprehensive budget plan at this point. As these events resolve themselves over the coming months and offer more clarity, the District will eventually be able to determine appropriate spending levels and identify what impact that will have on local taxpayers.

In any event, a budget "framework" for 2013-14 has been developed and conceptually approved by the Board of Education. This framework calls for the addition of several new staff members, the continuing commitment to control and fund staff benefits, enhanced programs and opportunities for students (K-12), and a desire to maintain District facilities.

25 Years - Fifteen additional dedicated Neenah Joint School District employees were welcomed into the Quarter Century Club in this year's annual event sponsored by the Board of Education. This year marked a special occasion as the club celebrated it's 50th annual dinner with over 90 attending at the Holiday Inn Riverwalk in Neenah.

We thank you all for your passionate commitment to our District's students, staff, families, and community!

The Board of Education recently approved staffing levels for the 2013-14 school year:

One administrator at the secondary level (7-12) +7.6 additional FTE teachers (K-12) +1.0 FTE communications manager (new position) -5.0 FTE support staff

The additional teaching positions will lower class sizes in the elementary grades, provide program support (math) at the secondary levels, and provide more direct support to special education programs.

For the second year in a row, a significant financial commitment is being made to maintain and enhance the District buildings and grounds. Among the larger projects expected to be completed this summer are partial roof replacement at Neenah High School, boiler replacement at Horace Mann Middle School, and parking lot reconstruction at Coolidge Elementary School.

The District's Technology Plan will continue as planned in 2013-14. Devices will be purchased for students in 4th and 8th grades with additional devices and technology purchased for Neenah High School students.

The District unveiled the first draft of the 2013-14 budget at a recent Board meeting. Although not all the pieces are in place at this time, it is expected that more clarity and direction to the District's budget will be received soon. Other events will occur throughout the summer months into early fall that will ultimately shape the final budget and tax levy/rate.

2013 National Merit Scholarship - Five Students from NHS

Neenah High School has the privilege of announcing that five students are finalists in the 2013 National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented high school seniors had an opportunity to continue in the competition for approximately 8,200 National Merit Scholarships, worth more than \$36 million, that were offered in March 2013.

To be considered for a Merit Scholarship® award, semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the finalist level of the competition. An estimated 90 percent of the semifinalists were expected to attain finalist standing, and approximately half of the finalists won a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar® title.

National Merit Scholarship Coporation (NMSC), a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Scholarships are underwritten by NMSC with its own funds and by approximately 500 business organizations and higher education institutions that share NMSC's goals of honoring the nation's scholastic champions and encouraging the pursuit of academic excellence.

Spanish Language for Sixth Graders at Horace Mann And Other World Language Opportunities Across the District

¿Hablan español? The World Language Task Force, consisting of Neenah Joint School District teachers and administrators, reconvened in the fall of 2012, continuing its work, which included a recommendation to the Board of Education to expand the study of world languages into earlier grades. After hearing their recommendation in February, the Board approved the expansion of the study of Spanish into grade six.

With this recommendation, a Spanish course will be available to all sixth graders for a semester, every other day, beginning in September 2013. Instruction will focus on the five C's: communication, culture, connections, comparisons and communities.

World Languages at Shattuck - Following grade six, students will have a choice to continue studying a world language in grade seven and beyond. Both Spanish I and French I are elective choices available to students beginning in grade seven.

World Language for Elementary Students? Expansion of world language into the elementary level is being considered as part of the Elementary Restructuring Plan.

The World Language Task Force will continue to monitor trends in world languages and consider enhancements to our world language program in the future, which could include consideration of other languages.

Shattuck Middle School's Velocity Academy An Exceptional Opportunity for Shattuck's At-Risk Students

Beginning in fall 2013, Shattuck Middle School will provide an exceptional opportunity for students. AIMS, Shattuck's program for at-risk students in seventh and eighth grade, will no longer be available. In its place, we are excited to rollout Velocity Academy, Neenah Joint School District's redesigned, enhanced middle school alternative education program.

Velocity Academy will offer students who meet pre-defined criteria an authentic, relevant, and rigorous learning experience with a community and service focus. Velocity students will be part of a 'school-within-a-school' instructional environment and follow a unique schedule which will consist of:

In addition to these elements, Velocity will include an essential service learning component for all students in the academy. Classroom instruction within Velocity will embrace project-based learning and will often connect directly to the service component in progress. Service learning projects will allow students to demonstrate critical thinking, apply instructional content to real-world situations, think globally, and work cooperatively. Through collaborative partnerships with local businesses, colleges/technical schools, and government agencies such as the City of Neenah and Winnebago County, Velocity students will gain skills and confidence through active learning for a cause.

Velocity Academy is research-based and was created with best practice in mind to support students who may otherwise struggle in a traditional setting. It was developed to specifically address the following: accelerated academic curriculum, strong literacy component, deliberate self-management program, personalized curriculum, project/experiential/work orientation, smaller school and class size, solid planning and administrative support system, collaborative community model, and comprehensive staff development programming.

We are proud to offer this rigorous opportunity for qualifying students who may flourish in a non-traditional, alternative learning environment. Be sure to check the Shattuck website for additional information about Velocity Academy!

Shattuck Interventions - Supporting Students in Need

Reading

Reading Intervention is a support class offered at Shattuck Middle School for any seventh or eighth grade student who is reading significantly below grade level. Students are identified through several data points. Placement decisions for reading intervention include observations from teachers, counselors, and parents. Once scheduled into reading intervention class, students create an Individual Learning Plan, which outlines personal reading goals and an action plan to meet those goals. Instruction is data driven, differentiated for all students, and follows the Reader's Workshop model.

Students meet two to five times per week in a small group setting. Learning targets are delivered through whole group instruction, guided reading, individual work time, and most importantly, one-on-one instruction with Shattuck's reading specialist. The purpose of this resource is for students to ultimately read at or above grade level, so they may be more successful, engaged learners in middle school and beyond.

Math

Math Intervention is a support class offered at Shattuck Middle School for any seventh or eighth grade student exhibiting significant math deficiencies. Several data points are used to identify students, including STAR Math and WKCE assessment scores, core math grades, and staff and parent recommendations. Students involved in math intervention receive a "double dose" of personalized math instruction every other day in one-on-one and small group settings.

This year, Shattuck is proud to pilot Renaissance Accelerated Math, a program that creates individualized lessons for each math intervention student. Lessons are based on data from STAR Math, an assessment given to all Shattuck students several times a year to track math progress. As students successfully complete each Accelerated Math unit, lessons adjust to fit their changing needs. In using this resource, our goal is to address math deficiencies and to close any achievement gaps which may exist among students.

Wisconsin Title I High-Achieving and High-Progress School Awards for Roosevelt Elementary and Alliance Charter

Roosevelt Elementary and Alliance Charter Schools were recently named recipients of the Wisconsin Title I High-Achieving and High-Progress School Awards, as awarded by the Department of Public Instruction. In order to be eligible for the Department of Public Instruction Wisconsin Title I High-Achieving School Award, a school must be a Title I eligible school and:

- earn a rating of Significantly Exceeding Expectations on the Wisconsin School Report Card
- meet all Annual Measurable Objectives for all students as well as subgroups
- have minimal achievement gaps or show evidence of reducing gaps between student subgroups
- meet test participation, absenteeism, and dropout goals.

Additionally, to be eligible for a Wisconsin Title I High-Progress School Award, a school must fall within the top 10 percent of schools experiencing student growth in reading and mathematics.

Through the data retreat process of analyzing and interpreting multiple sources of student data, the staff members at Roosevelt and Alliance have worked diligently to provide instruction to all of their students, providing interventions and enriching opportunities for every child.



The Roosevelt and Alliance communities are incredibly proud of this recognition that both of our schools have achieved. In the state of Wisconsin, there were a total of nine schools that earned both the Wisconsin Title I High-Achieving and High-Progress School Awards. We believe that the great education that we provide for our students at Roosevelt and Alliance is indicative of the fantastic education that all of our students in the Neenah Joint School District receive.

Asbestos management activities which occurred over the past 12 months include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1) the required 6-month inspections;
- 2) ongoing operations and maintenance projects were done as necessary by certified personnel; and
- 3) abatement of the Conant boiler room at Neenah High School.
