### **Board Adopts Resolution Urging Community Support to Remain Open**

The Neenah Joint School District is urging families and community members to pull together to reduce the spread of COVID-19 and help our local schools remain open.

A Board of Education resolution asks community members and leaders in the District's five municipalities to promote the activities and lifestyle changes to keep the virus in check, including handwashing, social and physical distancing, small social circles, and face coverings.

The goals of the resolution are to keep schools open for in-person instruction and to promote public health. The resolution asserts that the Centers for Disease Control and American Academy of Pediatrics have stated that in-person instruction provides students the best and most equitable opportunities for academic, social, and emotional learning as well as opportunities for exercise, healthy meals, and mental health services.

### **From the Superintendent**



I hope this message finds you healthy and safe as we continue to navigate these challenging times. We are so proud of the job our students and staff have done adapting to the changes in virtually every aspect of school as they previously experienced it. ## In Memoriam

### **NJSD Mourns Passing of Andrew Thorson**

The Neenah Joint School District is mourning the passing of the Deputy District Administrator for Business Services Andrew Thorson, who passed away on August 15.

Thorson, 38, died from complications after being stung multiple times by a swarm of hornets on August 2 at his home. He and his wife, Heather, have



four daughters: Abigail-11, Lydia-9, Emily-7 and Vivian-2.

"We are shocked and devastated by Andrew's passing," said superintendent Dr. Mary Pfeiffer. "He was not only extraordinary in his job, but he was an even more exceptional husband, father and human being. Our hearts ache for Heather, his girls and his entire family. We will continue to do whatever we can to help them through this difficult time for all of us."

Thorson brought a unique skill set to his position as a licensed engineer and licensed school business official with a Master's Degree in Business Administration. He was a visionary behind the creation of the District's \$114.9 million referendum and was instrumental in its passing in April. He also was an integral part of the early designs of the new Neenah High School with his construction and finance background as a member of the Core Planning Team.

The District's former Director of Facilities/Engineer, Thorson was beginning his 10th year in the District, having transitioned to his new role in January 2015. In 2019, Thorson was named the New School Business Manager of the Year award recipient by the Wisconsin Association of School Business Officials after guiding the District through numerous changes while implementing strategy, leadership and vision.



The Neenah Joint School District served 178,039 meals for an average of 3,123 meals per day through a bus delivery process during the COVID-19 school closure from March 17 through June 4. The meals were delivered Monday through Friday across the District at 97 different locations. All meals were free to any child 18 and under. Children received breakfast and lunch each day. The totals count breakfast and lunch separately.

## Three Neenah Seniors Named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists

Three Neenah High School seniors have been named semifinalists for the prestigious National Merit Scholarship Program.



Rachel Strandberg, Alicia Zhang and Daniel Zhao were honored for their performance among more than 1.5 million students nationwide who entered the 2021 competition by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

A total of 16,000 semifinalists were named nationwide, representing less than one percent of high school seniors. The three Neenah students are each vying for one of 7,600 National Merit Scholarships, which total more than \$30 million. Final scholarship awards will be announced next spring.

Strandberg (*pictured*, *top*) is the daughter of David and Lisa Strandberg and attended Roosevelt Elementary School. She has a 3.821 grade point average while taking numerous advanced courses.

Zhang (pictured, middle) is the daughter of Ron Zhang and Yan Luo and attended Coolidge Elementary School. She is a member of the Touch of Class orchestra and owns a 3.992 grade point average with a schedule of advanced courses.

Zhao (pictured, bottom) is the son of Hongwu Zhao and Hong Yao and attended

Clayton Elementary School beginning in fifth grade. He has a 3.957 grade point average while participating in several advanced courses.

## Free Meals Available for All NJSD Children Through End of December

Neenah Joint School District residents under age 18 are eligible for free meals through December 31, 2020 through a federally-funded waiver program.

All virtual learners and any child 18 or under who resides within the District boundary are eligible for a weekly meal pick-up of breakfast and lunch. These meals may be ordered for a single day or for the entire week and all orders will include both breakfast and lunch. An order form is available each week on the District food service website for families to order meals for the following week. Children attending school are receiving free lunches at school as usual.

Families who may qualify for free or reduced lunch should continue to submit applications as meals will be charged beginning in January.

## A Primary Focus

### Planning Process Underway for Future of Neenah Elementary Schools

The Neenah Joint School District is beginning the planning process for a restructuring of its elementary program beginning in 2023-24.

As part of the District's successful referendum in April, fifth graders will move to the new intermediate school and the elementary program will consist of students from kindergarten through fourth grade. This will result in approximately 20 fewer classes and about 500 fewer students across the District's nine elementary buildings. Additionally, with sixth graders mov-

ing to the intermediate school, Horace Mann School will be available and considered in future planning.

The Board of Education held a brainstorming session this summer related to the elementary program and facilities. That activity led to



the creation of a committee consisting of administrators, teachers, staff members, parents and community members. The group will begin meeting in October and will be charged with developing a recommendation for the elementary program starting with the 2023-24 school year. The group's initial work will be devoted largely to facility use with discussions about building capacity, building use and school boundaries. The committee plans to bring an initial recommendation to the Board in May

or June 2021.

The District will offer opportunities for community feedback throughout the process and has not begun making any decisions at this point.

### **New Neenah High School Designs Prepare Students for Today and the Future**


Below is the current version of the new Neenah High School site. Our vision is to create hands-on, flexible learning environments throughout the building to foster skills that include and student-centered collaboration spaces for the needs of today and well into the future.

The design will allow students, teachers and community partners to collaborate in preparing students for college, technical college, or entering career pathways.

Committee consisting of District employees and community members have been working with Bray Architects in the designs.

The new Neenah High School will have learning spaces communication, critical thinking, collaboration, and creativity. Some examples of collaborative spaces include:


- Collaboration spaces located adjacent to classrooms and labs
- Breakout spaces for small group instruction
- Flexible spaces within the naturally-lit cafeteria and atrium
- Spirit Concourse located between athletics and performing arts
- Courtyards with access from classrooms

Staff members at Wilson Elementary and all schools throughout the District participated in a unique virtual convocation that welcomed back staff on August 25. Technology allowed the participants from all locations to interact with each other.

### **Kiplin Chosen as Clayton Principal**

Bringing nearly a decade of experience at the elementary school level, Nicole Kiplin has been selected as the new principal at Clayton Elementary.



Kiplin served as Dean of Students at Houdini Elementary in Appleton the past two years. She implemented numerous mental health, behavioral and attendance initiatives in her short time and saw discipline referrals drop 47 percent in her first year. Houdini is one of the largest elementary schools in the Fox Valley with over 600 students.

Prior to her role at Houdini, Kiplin spent six years as a classroom teacher at Lincoln Elemen-

tary in Appleton. She also coordinated summer school programs at Richmond Elementary in Appleton the past five summers.

Kiplin is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh and earned her Master's Degree in Administration from National Louis University. She holds licenses in elementary education, administration and supervision and curriculum development.

### **NJSD Asbestos Removal Report**

The Board of Education approved an Asbestos Management plan in accordance with the Federal Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA). A copy of the District-wide plan is on file at the Administration Building, 410 South Commercial Street. Inquiries about the plan should be directed to the Director of Facilities at (920) 751-6800, ext 10133. Each school building also has a plan, which is on file in the principal's office. Inquiries about a building's plan should be directed either to the building principal or to the school secretary. Asbestos management activities which occurred over the past 12 months include, but are not limited to, the following: 1) the required 6-month inspections; and 2) ongoing operations and maintenance projects done as necessary by certified personnel.

## Fall Sports Limited to Girls Golf and Boys and Girls Cross Country

Neenah High School athletes competed in boys and girls cross country and girls golf during the fall with all other fall sports moving to an alternate fall season in the spring.

The decision was based on the application of three criteria: whether existing safety measures were sufficient to ensure safety of student-athletes, whether participation in the sport would enhance the emotional well-being of student-athletes and whether there would be sufficient competition in our local area.

The WIAA identified five sports as "low-risk" activities: boys and girls cross country, girls golf,



girls swimming and diving and girls tennis. No other Fox Valley Association school that offers girls swimming and diving competed in the fall and only two other girls tennis programs competed. Four other sports were identified as "high-risk" activities: football, boys soccer, boys volleyball and girls volleyball.

The alternate fall season will begin Feb. 15 for girls swimming and diving. Boys and girls volleyball will start practice on Feb. 22. Football and girls tennis start on March 8 with boys soccer beginning on March 22.

A decision regarding the status of winter sports had not been made as of late October.
