## Contest Nets Coolidge a $\mathbf{\$ 2 0 , 0 0 0}$ Grant

Coolidge Elementary will have $\$ 20,000$ in new playground equipment after the school community rallied to finish fourth among 10 finalists in a nationwide online voting contest during June. The top five finishers in the voting received the grant.

## Spring Road and Hoover Elementary Both Receive "Safe Routes to School" Awards

Spring Road Elementary and Hoover Elementary Schools in Neenah have been recognized for their efforts in helping students walk to school with awards by the East Central Safe Routes to School Program.


Spring Road received a Silver Award and Hoover was recognized with a Bronze Award. A total of 15 schools were honored out of 130 participating schools in a 10 -county region.

The program recognizes schools that support and promote safe walking and biking through safety programs, activity tracking and community participation. Award winners were based on a three-year cycle from 2011-14.

Both Spring Road and Hoover hold a "Walk to School Wednesday" program where the teachers walk out and meet students and their families to walk back to school with them. They also host bike safety programs for students and Spring Road has promoted activity in the community through a "Fire Up Your Feet" tracking program.

# LENDING A HAND NJSD Donation Aids African Students 



About 100 desks no longer used by Neenah students will be delivered to students in Liberia through a donation by the Neenah Joint School District to the International Children's Fund (ICF).

The Neenah-based, non-profit organization provides humanitarian aid to desperately poor children and families throughout the world. ICF primarily operates in Ghana, Liberia, Kenya, Sudan and Uganda.

Horace Mann Middle School operations staff member Jared Schmidt contacted ICF to determine their interest in the used equipment. The District delivered about 50 desks to ICF's Neenah warehouse in late June and ICF picked up another 50 desks about a week later. Some student chairs stored at the Washington Early Learning Center were also donated to ICF.
"This is an incredible donation from the District and a nice surprise," said ICF President Lori Fulcer. "We loved the fact the District was very forward thinking and instead of filling up a landfill they thought about how they can help other kids around the world.
"These desks and chairs had been sitting in storage for several years and were headed for a dumpster," said District Director of Facilities/Engineer Adam Krieger. "We're excited to be able to find a positive use for them and impact other children."

This is not the District's first donation to ICF as they have provided sporting equipment and school supplies in the past. Specifically, the girls basketball program has donated several used basketballs and jerseys, while ICF has also collected leftover school supplies in bins at the end of the school year.

## Horace Mann Named One of 250 National Healthy Schools

Horace Mann Middle School is one of 250 schools nationwide honored as with a National Healthy Schools Award by the Alliance for a Healthier Generation.

Horace Mann was recognized at the bronze level. Staff from Horace Mann will receive the award at the Healthier Generation Leaders' Summit in October in Washington, D.C.

The Alliance for a Healthier Generation provides schools with guidelines for implementing a healthy school environment. Through an assessment tool and a customized action plan, the framework helps schools work towards a National Healthy Schools Award.

To earn the award, schools must demonstrate implementation of best practices in six different areas: School Health and Safety Policies and Environment, Health Education, Physical Education and Other Physical Activity Programs, Nutrition Services, Health Promotion for Staff and Family and Community Involvement.

Horace Mann has been active in the "Play 60 " program, holding wellness activities for its students on each of its half days. The award also recognized the District's Wellness Education curriculum and Wellness program.

Horace Mann's food service from Chartwell's was commended for its commitment to adding healthier foods to the breakfast and lunch menu and the food service employees' participation in regular training to maintain a high quality of service and food safety. The staff's involvement in the District's staff wellness programs was also a key factor in receiving the award.

## Traveling "Care-A-Van" Makes Impact on Neenah Community

A new summer school enrichment course called the "Traveling Care-A-Van" assisted numerous community organizations and individuals throughout the summer. Under the direction of Taft and Wilson Elementary counselor Steph Levine, the group consisted of 14 students entering fourth through sixth grades.

## Clutch Putt Lands Galloway State Individual Golf Championship

Junior Sam Galloway became the second Neenah High School athlete to win a WIAA state boys golf individual title by shooting a two-under par 142 to capture the Division 1 crown at University Ridge Golf Course in Madison.

Galloway, who was also named the Golf Coaches Association of Wisconsin Player of the Year, was one of only two players in any division to shoot under par for the two-day tournament. He had just three bogeys in his 36 holes and made a fourfoot birdie putt on the last hole for a one-stroke win over Greendale junior Nate Thomson.

Galloway joins Kurt Sowle as Neenah's only individual boys golf champions. Soule shot a 158 to win the 1982 state championship when the WIAA offered a fall golf tournament.

Galloway entered the second day in a three-way tie for first place at one-under par. He moved to three-under par with birdies on the eighth and ninth holes, but then had bogeys on holes 13 and 17 to drop to a one-stroke lead. Thomson made a 15 -foot birdie putt to tie for the lead before Galloway calmly sank his winning putt.

A 4.0 student, Galloway was an Academic All-State selection. He was the medalist in 15 of his 18 meets played this season and posted an 18-hole stroke average of 73.38 . He was named the Fox Valley Association Player of the Year and was named first-team All-Conference for the third straight year.

The state Player of the Year award is voted upon by a committee that incorporates a player's raw scoring average and difficulty of courses played throughout the season.

## Season Tickets Available for Neenah High School Athletics

Fans of Neenah High School athletics will have the opportunity to purchase season passes for both home and away events for the upcoming 2015-16 school year.

Adult passes cost $\$ 60$ for the entire year and are good for all home football, boys and girls basketball, boys and girls soccer, boys and girls volleyball, boys and girls hockey, wrestling and drama events for the season. Student passes are available for all Neenah Joint School District students in grades K-12 for $\$ 30$ for the year. Single-event tickets are sold for $\$ 5$ for adults and $\$ 3$ for students the night of the event. The passes are good for all home Neenah High School events, excluding WIAA and conference postseason events.

For the first time this year, a Fox Valley Association "On the Road" pass will also be available. The pass costs $\$ 25$ and allows fans to attend one Neenah away game at each opposing FVA school. A total of 100 passes will be sold and they are valid for all FVA regular season conference games and conference tournaments, including Valley Football Association games at FVA member schools.

The season passes may be purchased at the Neenah High School office from 7:30 a.m.-4 p.m. daily.

## Neenah Finance Bowl Team Captures State Championship

Neenah High School's Finance Bowl team of Matt Bourland, Ally Kaul, Olivia Stindt and Evan Thomsen captured the state championship on April 29 in Milwaukee.

Neenah defeated D.C. Everest High School in the finals for its first state championship in the five-year history of the event under its current format. Neenah has sent at least one team to state every year and was runner-up in 2012 and 2014. Thomsen was also a member of last year's runner-up team.

Neenah was among 14 schools that participated in the state meet after advancing from regional competition. They answered over 130 questions in five rounds pertaining to personal finance, business finance and economics in a game show format. The meet was held at ManpowerGroup in Milwaukee.
Neenah had three teams compete at the regional tournament in early April and all placed in their respective brackets. The teams are coached by high school teacher Kris Labbus. Over 600 students from throughout the state participate in the tournament.

An anonymous donor has provided $\$ 50,000$ and pledged another $\$ 50,000$ over the next five years to support the trip. Families will be responsible to pay $\$ 30$ per student, while those on reduced lunch will be charged $\$ 15$ per student and free lunch students will not be charged. The District will pay one-third of the total cost and other donors will be sought for additional funding. Total cost of the experience, including meals, lodging and transportation will be about $\$ 36,000$ per year.
"This is one of those unique things that helps set Neenah apart," School Board President Scott Thompson said at the August 4 meeting when the trip was approved. "This really helps with the connection coming from the elementary schools to a bigger school."
For decades, Neenah sixth graders had a similar experience at a camp near Green Lake. However, that experience was removed from the curriculum as part of a budget reduction in 2009.
The District will be creating an endowment to sustain this learning experience over the long term.
