4K COMING TO NEENAH

Board Approves Program for 2015-16

Children in the Neenah Joint School District will have the opportunity to attend a four-year-old kindergarten program beginning in the 2015-16 school year. The Board of Education approved the program at its Dec. 16 meeting.

The voluntary program will be five half-days with a morning and an afternoon session. Classes will be held at Washington Elementary School and other District buildings with available classrooms. A request for proposal will be put out to community facilities to host any additional classrooms needed. All staff will be hired and evaluated by the District.

Two community input sessions were held in November to gauge interest and gather feedback for the program, which aims to better prepare students academically and socially for kindergarten.

Registration for the program will begin in February and more details will be provided in a packet mailed to prospective families in January. Those interested in enrolling their child in the program who have not received a packet by Jan. 31 should call the administration building at 920-751-6800.

A curriculum will be developed through Wisconsin Department of Instruction standards and input from current District kindergarten teachers. Stacie Nelson, currently the part-time administrator at Washington, has been given a full-time contract to oversee the program.

Transportation will be offered by the District, however, details will not be determined until sites are established and registration is completed.

4K: What You Need to Know

- ♦ 4K is a voluntary public education program for eligible District residents.
- ♦ The program is regulated by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and employs licensed teachers hired by the District.
- ♦ Registration for the fall of 2015 will begin in February.
- ♦ The program will be half-day sessions held five days per week. There will be morning and afternoon sessions.
- ♦ The program will recognize a slight increase in the mill rate, which will still be the lowest in the Fox Valley.

Neenah High School Wins \$25,000 Grant in State Farm Safe Driving Campaign

A recent safe driving online voting campaign netted Neenah High School a \$25,000 grant from State Farm Insurance.

Neenah was one of 100 winners nationwide, including one of 50 among large schools, in the "Celebrate My Drive" competition. The program had 3,283 registered schools as individuals were asked to log onto a website to make a pledge toward safe driving. Each e-mail address was permitted one vote per day over a 10-day span in October.

Neenah is required to invest at least 10 percent of the grant on a teen driver safety program for students. Neenah plans to use the remaining funds to remodel common areas in the Armstrong wing for student use.

Words From the Superintendent



Since taking on the superintendent role six years ago, I've been asked many times why Neenah doesn't have a four-year-old kindergarten program. In that time, we have surveyed the community and found overwhelming support for this program.

After careful consideration, I'm excited to say our School Board will support four-year-old kindergarten beginning in 2015-16.

Our current kindergarten program enrolls students who enter with a wide range of skills, both academically and socially. One of the primary goals of our four-year-old program is to better prepare all of our students for kindergarten with school expectations and the basics for improving their reading and math skills entering elementary school.

It is important to note that all of our four-year-olds will be taught by teachers hired and evaluated by the Neenah Joint School District. It also should be noted that the program is completely voluntary.

Many of you are likely wondering about potential costs to the program. We do anticipate a slight increase in our mill rate, but it will still remain the lowest in the Fox Valley as it has been for several years. We are still working out details on transportation and staffing, as well as many operational details.

This program is an investment in our students. It is about better preparing our students for school. It is about making a significant impact on the future academic success of our children. It is about making the Neenah Joint School District the best it can be.

Thank you for your support as we take on this new endeavor. It is sure to be exciting and impactful on our children.

TAKING ORBIT

NHS Staff Helps Families

Families of Neenah High School students are receiving assistance through a new program called, "the Orbit." Created by Neenah High School staff members, the Orbit is a closet filled with personal hygiene items, clothing, school supplies and a limited amount of non-perishable food items. Students and families in need are identified by school counselors and then escorted to the closet to get items.

Staff members at the school have donated items and the Educational Foundation of Neenah provided a \$750 grant to help with the start up. One of the freshman seminar classes assisted with a collection drive to fill the closet.



The Orbit has an inventory list to keep track of items and a request list in case a specific item or size is needed. A list of needed items is available on the NJSD website at: www.neenah.k12.wi.us/community/nhsorbit.cfm.

The Orbit also welcomes monetary donations that are tax deductible and partnerships with local businesses. Individuals or businesses are invited to check the list of needs on the website and drop their donations, marked "Orbit" at the high school main Door #3.

This school year there are over 70 families identified as homeless in the Neenah Joint School District and 31 percent of high school students are in the free or reduced lunch program. The Neenah-Menasha Emergency Society and several parents have also assisted in preparing the Orbit this fall.

Community Benefits From Seminar Classes

Numerous community organizations benefitted from Neenah High School freshman students during projects by their Freshman Seminar classes this fall.

Organizations such as Children's Hospital, Christine Ann Center, Fox Valley Emergency Shelter, Special Olympics, Neenah-Menasha Fire Department, Neenah Animal Shelter and Fox Valley Humane Association all received financial assistance or supplies through the projects. Neenah elementary schools, assisted living facilities and local residents also benefitted.

The Freshman Seminar program is in its fourth year and was designed as a way to help acclimate incoming students to Neenah High School. Each class is led by a Neenah High School teacher and several upperclass students. One aspect of the class is to create and execute a community service project.

Each of the 21 classes had a different service project and displayed them at a "Community Service Fair" at Neenah High School on Nov. 26. The fair was held in the Armstrong wing of the school and provided each group a way to present the details of their project to other students and staff. Members of local charitable community groups also attended the fair to show students additional volunteer opportunities that are available.

NJSD Asbestos Removal Report

The Board of Education approved an Asbestos Management plan in accordance with the Federal Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA). Three Neenah Students Named National Merit Semifinalists

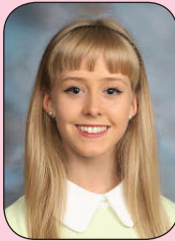
Three Neenah High School seniors have been selected as semifinalists for the prestigious National Merit Scholarship Program.

Clara Lambrecht, Adelaide Zwick and Margaret Zwick all achieved the honor and are among 16,000 semifinalists nationwide. They will be vying for 7,600 National Merit Scholarships, which total about \$33 million. Final awards will be announced in the spring.

Clara is the daughter of Andrew and Lynne Lambrecht, while Adelaide and Margaret are twin daughters of Kenneth Zwick and Carol Hollar-Zwick. All three students have grade point averages over 3.98 while taking a full schedule of advanced placement courses. Each student is also involved in school music activities.

Neenah had 36 middle school girls participate in the Expanding Your Horizons Conference in Madison on Nov. 8. The girls experienced activities to see the wide range of career options for women in science, engineering, and math. They learned about different careers and visited various workplaces to interact with professional women who work in these fields.

Neenah Students Excel on Advanced Placement Exams

Neenah High School had 111 students honored for exceptional achievement on Advanced Placement exams during the 2013-14 school year, including five students who qualified for the National AP Scholar Award.

Recent graduates Shoun Abraham, Thomas Hameister, Nicholas Malcore and Julia Scruton were honored as National AP Scholars along with Evan Thomsen, who is a current senior. National AP Scholars earned an average score of 4 or higher on a five-point scale on at least eight AP exams. Hameister achieved at least a four on 14 different exams.

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program provides academically prepared students the opportunity to take rigorous college-level courses while still in high school and to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP exams. Overall, Neenah offers 17 College Board authorized classes to its students. Last year, a total of 319 Neenah students took 548 AP exams.

Neenah had 45 students qualify for the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning an average of at least 3.5 on all AP exams taken and posting scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams. Another 15 students qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP exams taken and earning scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams. An additional 51 students qualified for the AP Scholar Award by completing three or more AP exams with scores of 3 or higher.



Spring Road Elementary students participated in a Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Family Night with Georgia Pacific staff on Nov. 13. Georgia Pacific provided a grant and organized the event, while also working with NJSD staff and arranging presentations. More than 200 students and family members attended.

Special Olympians Share the Spotlight With Boys Basketball

It was a truly special night at the Ron Einerson Fieldhouse on Nov. 20 as Neenah's Special Olympics basketball team competed in primetime alongside the varsity boys basketball team.

Following the boys basketball team's annual "Meet the Rockets" scrimmage, the Rocket varsity players competed in a three-point shooting contest with Special Olympians athletes. The varsity players also assisted five Special Olympians in a skills competition prior to a game between the Special Olympics squad and a team of Neenah High School staff.



The pep band played during warmups and the starting lineups were introduced in front of a full "Rocket Rowdys" student section. The student section made signs for the individual Special Olympians and cheered throughout the game. The dance team also performed at halftime

with two Special Olympians as part of the squad. The Special Olympics team posted a 30-21 victory and the night was capped by a last-second shot and the student section rushing the floor to celebrate.

Neenah is one of a small number of Wisconsin districts to sponsor its own Special Olympics program. Coached by Mr. Chad Oeftger, the team competes in a variety of different sports throughout the year.

Hertting Defends State Diving Title With Record-Setting Day

For the third straight year, the WIAA Division 1 state diving champion came from the Hertting family. Hazel Hertting, a senior at Neenah High School, won her second straight state title after her sister, Greysen, won in 2012-13. Hazel set a state record with a total of 576.45 for her 11 dives.



The state title capped an amazing season for Hazel, who also set meet records at the WIAA sectional, Fox Valley Association championships and Neenah Invite. She finished the season undefeated and signed a letter of intent to dive at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Hazel has a 4.0 grade point average and is the daughter of Scott and Robin Hertting. Scott is a physics teacher at Neenah High School.



The varsity girls tennis team captured its third straight FVA title and finished as WIAA state runner-up for the fourth time in school history. Neenah lost to Arrowhead 5-2 in the state finals for its only loss of the season, completing the year 17-1. The team is coached by Kelly Van Handel, who played for the Rockets from 2004-07.

Neenah Well-Represented at State Honors Music Project

Neenah was represented by 12 students at the Wisconsin School Music Association State Honors Music Project Oct. 30-31 at the Wisconsin Music Conference in Madison.

Over 3,500 students from across the state applied for a position in the state honors band, choir and jazz ensembles. Neenah was represented in both the high school honors level for grades 10-12 and the middle level for grades 7-9. The high school ensembles performed at the Overture Center on State Street.

Performing with the high school ensembles were Jack Mulvey in band, John Payne in jazz and Kaley Camber, Kendall Kohlmeyer, Shannon Overesch and Belle Gallegos in orchestra. Participating in the middle level ensembles were Kayla McGinnis and

Rebecca Rieckmann in band and Grace Hackinson, Nathan Heywood, Kaylee Jepson and Mindara Krueger-Olson in orchestra.

The Wisconsin State Honors Music Project offers talented youth the opportunity to rehearse and perform with nationally-known conductors in a professional setting. Middle Level State Honors students receive their music in August and meet for the first time the day before their fall performance. High School State Honors students sight-read their music at their June Summer Camp and also rehearse before the fall concerts.

Neenah High School teacher and music department chair Kristina Stingle accompanied the students to Madison and serves as the state chair of the High School Honors Music Project.

A Hero's Welcome

Local Veterans Provide Perspective to NJSD Students

Schools in the Neenah Joint School District observed Veterans Day with special ceremonies and guest speakers, providing an invaluable learning experience for students.

Horace Mann and Shattuck Middle Schools welcomed veterans representing all major military branches and conflicts back to World



War II on Nov. 7. The Veterans were from the Wisconsin Veterans Home in King and the Knights of Columbus. Veterans from the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines participated in the first-time event. The schedule included veterans who served in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan.

The group featured individuals who survived the Holocaust, guarded the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, served in the Women's Army Corps and Operations Enduring Freedom, Desert Storm and Iraqi Freedom. About 20 veterans presented to students in social studies classes throughout the day at the two schools.

Neenah High School held a first-time ceremony in Pickard Auditorium on Nov. 11. Veterans were honored on stage as the American Legion Post 33 presented the colors. The Neenah High School orchestra played the national anthem, the band played the Armed Forces Salute and the choir sang God Bless America.

Student Evan Thomsen emceed the event and social studies teacher Lieutenant Colonel John Morgen addressed what it means to be a veteran. Art teacher Lisa Dorschner and student Ashley Hermans introduced a veterans display that will be in the halls of Neenah High School. The display will feature a variety of artwork by high school art students etched into metal by high school technology education students.



Senior citizens from throughout the community enjoyed dinner and a musical on Oct. 16 as part of Neenah High School's annual Senior Citizens Dinner Theatre. For just \$7 per person, seniors were treated to dinner served by administrators and students in the high school cafeteria followed by a performance of the Fall Musical, "Footloose."

Homecoming Has Added Purpose

Neenah High School's Homecoming week took on a bigger purpose for the second straight year as events benefitted the school's Special Education Department in memory of a classmate.

The week, dubbed the "Momentum," took place Sept. 29-Oct. 3 in memory of Alisha Haase, who would have been a senior this fall and was killed in a car accident on Aug. 30, just three days before the start of the school year. The event raised \$1,500 in funds in Alisha's memory, while also building school pride among current students and alumni.

This year's Homecoming week was a follow up to last year's successful "Comeback" week that benefitted student Xavier Sims, who was battling a bacterial brain infection.

The week began with an outdoor movie as "Finding Nemo" was shown at dusk in the main parking lot of Neenah High School on Sept. 29. A "powder puff" football game between a team of junior and senior girls and a female staff team was held Oct. 1. Both events raised money through selling concessions and passing a donation bucket.

The annual Homecoming parade was followed by a tailgate party outside Rocket Stadium with proceeds going to the Momentum. Students conducted a "Miracle Minute" at the football game by passing donation buckets through the bleachers.



Fifth graders from Clayton Elementary held their annual "Give-A-Kid-A-Book" community service project. Clayton families and staff donated 113 new books and \$682. With the donated money, the students were able to purchase an additional 144 new books to donate to Salvation Army and Boys' and Girls' Brigade.

Grant Helps Train Neenah Staff in Youth Mental Health

Seven individuals from the Neenah Joint School District and local agencies attended a week-long training in Madison to become certified trainers in Youth Mental Health First Aid.

The event was part of the two-year Project AWARE grant through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. The course teaches participants how to help youth who are developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. The training helps them identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness and substance abuse disorders.

NJSD counseling staff members Chris Christensen, Beth Altekruze and Jamie Lasee participated in the training, along with middle school teacher Jason Fridley, downtown campus teacher Rose Unser, high school police liaison officer Pat Pedersen and Winnebago County Youth Mental Health Supervisor Tom Matczynski.

Over the next two years, the seven individuals will train over 250 people throughout the Neenah Joint School District and local community who work with youth. Community partners for the project are the Winnebago County Department of Human Services and the Neenah Police Department.

By implementing Youth Mental Health First Aid, Neenah expects to see an increase in the mental health literacy of adults who interact with school-aged youth and increase awareness of mental health issues among school-aged youth.

The overall goal of Project AWARE is to expand the community's capacity to increase awareness of mental health issues, and connect children and youth with behavioral health issues to needed services.



Kasper Receives Wisconsin "Light of Wellness" Award

Sandy Kasper took a courageous journey on the road to significant lifestyle changes. After dropping over 60 pounds and regaining balance in her life, the Neenah Joint School District Administrative Assistant earned the Light of Wellness Healthy Behavior Award from the Wellness Council of Wisconsin.



The Healthy Behavior Award is presented annually to one individual statewide. The award celebrates the accomplishments of an employee who has made significant lifestyle changes by incorporating healthy behaviors as a result of participation in their employer's wellness program.

Kasper, who works in the Department of Instructional Technology at the Administrative Building, shut herself down after leaving an emotionally abusive marriage. She enlisted the support of the Christine Ann Center and friends and began to take steps toward a healthy lifestyle, eventually dropping 62 pounds. She uses MyFitnessPal to keep track of what she eats and stays busy by gardening or crocheting hats for the homeless.

To stay active, Kasper began by walking four blocks and added a half-block each time. She worked up to walking one hour per day and added short bouts of running.

Last fall, Kasper completed the Fox Cities Half Marathon. She participates in the NJSD wellness programs to give an extra push to practicing a healthy lifestyle.

Kasper works closely with others who have been in abusive relationships. Her advice: "Start slow, set small goals, don't give up and find support. It's a journey worth fighting for."

Thorson Promoted to Director of Business Services Position

The Neenah Joint School District didn't have to look far for its new Director of Business Services, selecting Director of Facilities/Engineer Andrew Thorson for the position.



Thorson is in his fourth year in Neenah and will assume his new duties on Jan. 5. Thorson replaces Kathy Davis, who resigned to accept a position in the DeForest Area School District and move closer to her hometown. The Board of Education approved Thorson's hire on Nov. 18.

Thorson holds a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from Marquette University and a Master of Business Administration from Cardinal Stritch University. He will begin working to obtain a license in School Business Management from UW-Whitewater in January. He is a licensed engineer in the state of Wisconsin.



The theatre technical crew earned first place at the Wisconsin High School Theatre Festival in La Crosse. The team of Tessa Ducat, Abbey Schwoerer, Adria Shelley, Austin Sopol and Bailey Boushele earned the award for their work with the play, "Land O'Plenty." The entire cast and crew earned an all-state award and Keaton Schultz collected an individual award for acting.



Shattuck students have been connected to technology more than ever before as every student in the school was issued a Chromebook at the start of the school year. The Chromebooks provide all students access to required educational materials needed for them to be successful. The Chromebook allows student access to Google Apps for Education and educational web-based tools as well as many other useful sites.



Horace Mann students participated in a FIRST Lego League Robotics competition in Appleton on Nov. 15. The program is in its first year and students have had an opportunity to learn how to program a robot, design a team name and logo and participate in team challenge events. FIRST teams meet twice per week for practice and will be judged against several other schools in their end-of-season competition.



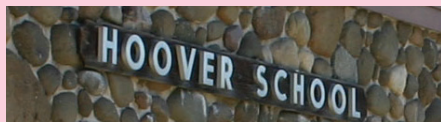
Alliance is again collecting old holiday lights.
