A Message from Dr. Pfeiffer

Spring is here, summer is upon us, and the last few weeks of school will soar past us. To suggest that it as been a busy year would be an understatement! We have made great gains in our four focus areas over the last school year!

Curriculum, Instruction, & Assessment – With a strong commitment to improve instructional practices, I am confident that our reading and math scores will realize targeted gains. This coordinated effort provides teachers and administrators with detailed information for improving student learning and providing high impact instruction. We are focused on creating a solid transition toward the realization of the mandated federal Common Core academic standards.

Communications - A team, consisting of staff and community members, continues to work toward creating a more efficient District communications model. The team is currently administering an informational survey that will help us better evaluate our communication needs. To take the survey, please go to **www.NeenahSurvey.org**. The survey will be available until June 8, 2012.

Resources – In May, the Board of Education received an initial draft of a budget framework for the 2012-13 school year. What was presented was a balanced budget. Included in that draft are the following:

- 1. Similar to our kindergarten class size, we will **lower class** sizes at the first grade in order to achieve a ratio of approximately **one teacher for every 20 students.**
- 2. A recommendation to change our **health insurance** to an option that would **save the District approximately \$1.8 million** over the next year.
- 3. The budget plan also proposes continued **technology improvement** via the use of **iPads and computers** across all academic levels, effectively aligned with our District Digital Conversation Plan focused on student learning.

- 4. A significant number of **major maintenance projects** totaling approximately **\$1.5 million** are included in the budget. The majority of the work will take place throughout the summer in preparation for the new school year.
- 5. An additional recommendation to decrease our Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) was presented to the Board of Education. This proposal would save the District approximately \$94 million over the next 26 years. A final recommendation concerning OPEB will be made in the fall of this year.

Evaluation - We continue to work in the area of evaluation on several fronts. We have implemented our new **faculty assessment model** this year and will add an **evaluation instrument** for our support staff later this year.

We believe that our evaluation and assessment models will more than meet the standards as outlined by the state and federal guidelines related to effective teachers and administrators.

As I have stated many times in the past, Neenah is a special place. As a beacon in our community, our District continues to shine bright in the Valley and throughout our state. Our schools are places that some districts merely dream about. "Neenah with Pride" continues to be reflected through our dedicated staff and supportive community. Neenah Joint School District is a special place to be! Have a great summer!

2012-2013 School District Budget Development Moves Forward

A year ago at this time, all eyes were on Madison as significant changes to school financing were being proposed, debated, implemented, and litigated. Your local school officials were trying to determine what effect, if any, these changes might have on students, parents, employees, and taxpayers.

Today, activity in Madison has calmed down (relatively speaking) and the District is well underway with the development of their 2012-13 budget. The budget process this year does not have as many of the uncertainties that clouded and hindered last year's budget process.

Similar to this year's budget (2011-12), employee salaries and benefits will once again dominate the budget development for 2012-13. The Board of Education is spending considerable time in this area as it seeks to find a balance that will attract and retain quality staff.

The District will continue to make a financial commitment towards lower class sizes in the primary grades, professional learning opportunities for employees, and necessary equipment and general learning materials (software, textbooks, etc.) for all students.

Major maintenance projects tentatively identified for inclusion in the District's 2012-13 budget have been identified. In addition, the District will continue to seek opportunities to lower general operating costs through the use of energy conservation techniques and cost containment practices.

As part of the 2012-13 budget process, the District's food service program will be reviewed and scrutinized with the expectation that next year, students will be provided with a healthier, more diversified menu. It is anticipated that the food service program will become an efficient, self-supporting operation next year and for years to come.

A Passion for Excellence - Professional Learning Days

Teacher to Teacher Development Initiatives Improve Student Learning The ultimate goal of professional learning for staff is improved student learning. Professional learning that is systemic, focused, authentic, and job-embedded is most effective.

How does professional learning like that happen in the Neenah Joint School District (NJSD)?









There is a commitment to professional learning at all levels in NJSD, kindergarten through grade 12, with a focus on district-level priorities such as technology, differentiated instruction, and the Common Core State Standards as well as building-based needs like school improvement planning.

A team of educators builds a learning plan for staff based upon the needs of our students. Knowing that students would be using mobile devices as learning tools, for example, the District launched a multi-year plan for teachers to become more conversant with mobile technology. And, like students, teachers are tested on technology proficiency as well. With new standards in math and English/language arts on the horizon, teachers are delving deep into the standards and determining the instructional implications that will ultimately impact student learning.

All of this learning and more happens, in part, on the District's professional learning days. Approximately nine half-day sessions are dedicated to staff professional learning throughout the school year. Students are dismissed from the classroom and the staff members become the students. The District has employed a workshop model for staff learning. There is a cycle in the workshop approach whereby staff learn, practice, reflect, and then share with others. Hallmark to the model is that teachers are teaching teachers. Our staff has a wealth of knowledge and experience to share with one another, that fits perfectly with the workshop model. Professional learning days provide the opportunity for authentic, focused, job-embedded experiences that directly impacts student learning.

ACADEMICS - For several years, the Neenah Joint School District continues to have the highest ACT scores in the Valley. Of the graduating 2011 seniors, 84% furthered their education in post-secondary studies, 3% served in the military, and another 6% pursued either direct employment or job training. In 2011, we had three National Merit Finalists and one National Merit Scholar.

Our Debate Team shapes articulate speakers and we have had students win recognition at the state and national levels. Our Math Team competes and consistently ranks among the best in the Valley. We continue to place as national finalists in the American Chemical Society's Chemistry Olympiad.

ATHLETICS - Neenah High School consistently rises to the occasion in competitive sports environments; competing and winning at state and national levels. Many of our programs have won championships not only year after year, but for decades at division and state-wide levels.

FINE ARTS - NHS enjoys a strong culture of pursuit and support for the arts - with programs ranging from art competitions, drama, theater, voice, varying music genres, dance, string, brass, percussion, and wind instruments. NHS has earned top marks in state competition and has traveled on a national level to share their talents by performing for others.



Early Learning Opportunities in the Neenah Joint School District



Neenah Joint School District's Early Learning Center, located at Taft School, is dedicated to providing services to preschool children who have a disability or are considered at risk. Students who attend the Early Learning Center develop social, communication, and readiness skills through a wide variety of programs.

What types of preschool programs are offered in the Neenah Joint School District? The Neenah Joint School District provides a wide variety of programming for preschool students who reside within the District. All of our programs meet state standards for early childhood education and are led by certified early childhood staff members. The type of programming a child receives is determined by his/her developmental skill level. Many children participate in our Child Find Screenings, and based upon their performance, are recommended for further evaluation or considered for the Title 1 Preschool Program. Listed below are the programs offered in the Neenah Joint School District:

Community - If found to have a disability, some children receive services in their natural environment, which could include their preschool, home, childcare setting, or other community location. Our Early Learning Center staff has a collaborative relationship with community-based providers that offer a variety of options for young children in their natural environment.

Itinerant Speech & Language Services - Some students may receive speech-language therapy in either an individual or small group therapy session at Taft Early Learning Center. The duration and frequency of these sessions are determined by the child's Individual Education Plan (IEP) team and are led by one of our certified Speech-Language Pathologists.

Preschool Phonology Program - Our Preschool Phonology Program offers intensive speech-language therapy to students who qualify. This instruction, led by a certified Speech-Language Pathologist, meets twice a week.

Early Childhood Special Education Program - The Early Childhood Program provides instruction to students who have been identified as having a disability. Morning and afternoon half-day programs are offered Monday - Thursday. The frequency and duration of services are determined by the child's IEP team. A certified Early Childhood Special Education Teacher leads all of our classes.

Title 1 Preschool - This early intervention program, led by our certified Pre-K teacher, assists children who are considered at risk following our child find screenings. This program is designed for students who are 4 years old by September 1. The program is offered half-days, Monday-Thursday at Taft.

How can my child access these programs?

The Neenah Joint School District conducts developmental screenings for preschool-aged children who reside within the District. A Child Find Preschool Screening can answer many questions about your child's development. The purpose of the screening is to identify children who may need access to our programs at Taft.

The screening dates for 2012-2013 are:

September 6 and 7, 2012 October 5, 2012 November 2, 2012 January 4, 2013 February 1, 2013 March 8, 2013 April 5, 2013

If you have, or know of someone who has, a child who is between the ages of two years, nine months and age five, **please contact Taft Early Learning Center at 920.751.6980 ext. 101 to schedule an appointment.** The screenings are FREE and take approximately one hour.

Early Childhood Education in Neenah is a true partnership.

Parents are an important part of the team and process of educating children. Parents become actively involved in our programs and learn a variety of ways to help their child through home activities. Educational parent meetings are also provided throughout the school year. Parents are given support and encouragement by participating in activities with parents of other children at the Early Learning Center.

Board of Education Supports Staffing Plan Focused on Lower Class Sizes and Core Academics

4.8 MORE TEACHING POSITIONS

A new District Math Coordinator
A new teacher for Alliance Charter
2 new teachers for Horace Mann
K-5 projected class size is 22.1 students
6-12 projected class size is 24-28 students

The Board of Education approved an additional 4.8 teaching positions for the 2012-13 school year. The Board unanimously supported to create a District Math Coordinator position which will provide curriculum, instruction, and assessment articulation for all NJSD schools.

The District Math Coordinator will be responsible for working with teachers on the implementation of the Common Core curriculum, the analysis of data and assessment to improve instruction, and will serve as a professional resource to teachers in meeting the learning needs of their individual students.

The Board also approved an additional teacher for Alliance Charter School and two additional teachers for Horace Mann Middle School. The additional teaching positions are a result of increased interest in the charter school and an increased enrollment at Horace Mann.

The average class size for the elementary K-5 is projected at 22.1 students. The projected class size in the core academic areas at the secondary level range from 24 - 28.

Although each decision is difficult to make when balancing a budget, the Board of Education continues to provide support to maintain lower class sizes in the primary grades and core academic areas while also supporting a rigorous and challenging curriculum for all students.

OVERALL SPORTS STANDINGS AT A GLANCE

Several Neenah High School sports and activities recently wrapped up a successful winter season with state and national tournament titles and appearances.

Senior wrestler Ryan Bonikowske made his **third trip** to the **state tournament** and placed **fourth overall**, finishing the season with a **41-2 overall record**. Bonikowske was state-runner up in 2011 as a junior.

Senior powerlifter Charles McDonald won his third straight 181-pound state championship and also won the top lifter award at the national championship meet. Neenah's boys and girls programs captured the combined state title for the 16th time in program history and placed second at the national competition, finishing just six points out of the top spot.

Neenah sent several boys swimmers and divers to the WIAA state meet this year. Sophomore diver Draven Feustel placed 12th overall. Junior Ryan Emenecker was 17th in diving, sophomore Michael Bourland was 18th in the 50-yard freestyle, and sophomore Nick Kehler was 23rd in the 100-yard freestyle. The 200-yard freestyle relay placed 18th and the 400-yard freestyle relay finished 21st.

Both the Neenah boys' and girls' bowling teams qualified for state competition. The girls team placed 12th and the boys were 14th. The girls averaged 176.9 over their 15 games and had the highest single game of any team with a 257 in their opening game. The boys averaged 201.2 for the day.
