This year, we continue to focus on the following District initiatives:


- **1. Resources** make the most of District resources (i.e. personnel, technology, finance, facilities)

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE - 2009/2010 ACT Test Scores Neenah Ranks #1 in Fox Valley ACT Composite



Once again, Neenah is the top-ranked school district in the Fox Valley region in each of the four subject areas including reading, English, math, and science. Additionally, Neenah had the highest composite score of 24.5. Currently, Neenah has the 12th highest ACT score of 426 school districts in Wisconsin.

This achievement is reflective of our outstanding students, staff, and parents.

NJSD Meets Wisconsin State Budget Challenges, Maintains Core Objectives, and Reduces Tax Levy

Hard Work and Commendable Efforts for a District that Ranks Among the Highest Achieving and Lowest Tax Levy Rates in the Fox Valley Area!

On March 1, 2011, Governor Walker delivered his State of Wisconsin budget address to a very interested state audience. The budget proposal significantly reduced state aid to K-12 schools and essentially prohibited school districts from increasing property taxes to make up for any loss of revenue.

The state budget, containing numerous changes to school funding, was signed into law by Governor Walker on June 26, 2011. The collective bargaining legislation (Wisconsin Act 10) became law on June 28, 2011 - two days before the beginning of the school district's new fiscal year.

Suddenly, but not unexpectedly, the District found itself needing to reduce the 2011-12 budget by approximately \$4.6 million. A portion of the needed expenditure reductions would come from legally mandated changes to their pension plan (Wisconsin Retirement System). Other legislative changes allowed for the District to receive greater contributions toward the cost of their health and dental insurance plans.

With the assistance of the new state laws and by identifying new strategic opportunities, the District has not only met its expenditure reduction goal of \$4.6 million but it was able to maintain programs that are central to the District's core values. The student to teacher ratio in kindergarten is the lowest it (cont. page 2)

has been in many years; a plan to provide all students with advanced, mobile technology has been initiated, (see page 6 for more), and the District continues to aggressively address its long term obligations.

On November 1, 2011 the Board of Education (BOE) adopted the 2011-12 budget and certified the 2011-12 school property tax levy. The total budget decreased by over 8 percent from the prior year due in large part to employees paying for more of their own benefit costs. The equalized property tax rate (for school purposes) declined by 2.4% from the previous year. The equalized property tax rate for the Neenah Joint School District is among the lowest in the Fox Valley Area.

The development and implementation of the 2011-12 budget is essentially complete and management of the budget continues on a daily basis. While maintaining a focus on student learning, we continue to look for additional opportunities to save money for District taxpayers.

NJSD takes on Bullying

Barbara Coloroso Presents to Staff and Community



We Can All Do This Together - On Wednesday, September 28, during the District-wide Fall In-service, all staff were treated to a presentation about bullying, by expert Barbara Coloroso. Coloroso is an internationally recognized speaker in the areas of parenting, teaching, school discipline, non-violent conflict resolution, and reconciliatory justice. She is also the author of five international best-sellers, including her books *kids are worth it!* and *The Bully, the Bullied, and the Bystander.*

Thanks to our sponsors, NJSD was able to open our in-service doors to educational staff from over 18 local school districts. For two hours staff learned strategies on how to identify and deal with bullying situations. Barbara entertained, enlightened, and educated as she explained the importance of addressing bullying behaviors early on. Staff then divided into smaller groups and were led in discussion by the NHS LAUNCH Leaders, breakout sessions coordinated by Mr. Chad Buboltz and Mr. Brian Borchardt.

In the evening, Coloroso presented to parents and community members from throughout the Fox Valley. She explained how parents are crucial in helping raise kind children. Parents and teachers alike praised the program, exclaiming: "Wow! Amazing information and knowledge! Wish this would have been available to my parents!" and "One of the best (programs) NJSD has offered."

This program was sponsored by the John J. and Ethel D. Keller Fund within the Community Foundation for the Fox Valley Region, the NJSD Student Assistance Program, the Educational Foundation of Neenah (EFN), and the Neenah Education Association (NEA). 

A Passion for Excellence - Improving Student Achievement

How Should Students Learn? The Framework for Student Success is a guide for improving achievement for all students in the Neenah Joint School District (NJSD). In a previous Dialogue article, the question of what students should learn was answered, in part, with the Common Core State Standards. Continuing the series, "A Passion for Excellence – Improving Student Achievement," this edition of the Dialogue focuses on how students should learn. Additionally, it addresses what the District does when students are challenged with learning or already know the material.

Technology Integration and Differentiated Instruction

Learning for all students starts at the universal or classroom level. To aid in meeting the varied needs of our students in the classroom, NJSD staff has been participating in a multi-year professional development plan around differentiating instruction. Incorporating learning opportunities that match students' interests, learning styles, and readiness for the information are common ways to differentiate instruction.

This year's professional learning plan integrates differentiated instruction with technology, which is a natural partnership. Integrating differentiated instructional practices with technology devices and applications will enhance student engagement and learning. Chris Lehman, Principal of the Science Leadership Academy, Philadelphia, PA, captured this relationship when he said, "We will begin to shift the focus from learning tools to learning with tools."

Neenah has established high expectations regarding how we want students to learn and is excited about the new challenges and learning opportunities that the integration of differentiated instructional practices and technology brings to our staff and students. Literacy and Numeracy - Literacy and numeracy are cornerstones of successful student learning. For the past five years, every school in the NJSD has developed school improvement plans that include lofty yet attainable goals and action steps to improve student learning in both of these content areas. School improvement plans are organized around curriculum, instruction and assessment, classroom interventions, technology integration, and student, family, and community support. We have high expectations for ourselves in literacy and numeracy and we are committed on a daily basis to achieve our goals.

Intervention and Enrichment - We want our students to learn in a classroom environment that is constantly diagnosing individual and group needs and prescribing enrichment and intervention activities based on individual levels of achievement. The academic needs of most students are met at the universal level. However, if student achievement through a number of measures, including formal and informal assessments and teacher observation, indicates that the student has already mastered the material or needs further assistance, teachers respond based on the student's individual needs.

NJSD Winter Weather Closing Procedures

The Neenah Joint School District provides transportation for approximately 3,000 of its 6,400 students. Under normal circumstances, a decision to close or delay school is predicated on the safe transportation of our children to and from school and will generally be made no later than 6:00 a.m. This will provide time for local radio and television stations to broadcast school closings, allow time for the bus contractor to notify drivers not to report, and allow time for parents to make day care arrangements for children who will be staying home. Safety for children, employees, and parents is the overriding factor in making the decision to close school.

Generally when school is closed, all after-school activities will also be canceled. When a decision is made to close the Neenah Public Schools, it has been agreed that all private schools being served with transportation in the District will also be closed. It should be noted that in the past there has been some confusion when the announcements have referenced the "Lena Schools" rather than the Neenah Schools. Maximizing Student Potential

Through Differentiation at Tullar Elementary



Life in a Second Grade Math Classroom - Neenah Joint School District encourages differentiation in all classrooms in order to maximize student potential along ALL levels. This means teaching to individual student needs, not to a whole class as if they all have the same knowledge when a unit is entered.

At Tullar Elementary School, second grade teachers, Jennifer Michalkiewicz, Lisa Cummings, and Kat Weiler, in conjunction with Math Support Specialist, Amy Vosters differentiate in math for every unit, all year, every day, and with every student through flexible grouping.

What is flexible grouping? Flexible grouping is a model where all students are placed in instructional groups that may change for each concept area. Groups are based on each student's performance, ability level, and need. Flexible grouping enables teachers more time to provide focused instruction to a narrower range of students. Some students demonstrate they have mastered certain skills and concepts, other students show that they still need help with particular skills. The goal of flexible grouping is to ensure that all students are being challenged and are not taught beyond their instructional level.

Increased focused instruction promotes higher student achievement, because the focused groups enable teachers "to create in depth and unique programming that meets the changing needs of students," explains Mrs. Vosters. Mrs. Michalkiewicz agreed, "In one class, we can cover a standard number line from 1-10. In another class, we can discuss number lines from negative to double or triple-digit numbers. It's a great opportunity to celebrate math diversity and exploration!" The flexibility to move students from one group to another is an essential component that keeps them engaged and challenged.

Compare this new learning environment to the old school model where students received advanced or remedial instruction based on an annual test score. Now, with more frequent and specific testing, all students are given the opportunity to switch back and forth to study curriculum comfortably within like knowledge groups. They are able to shift from group to group for every unit based on their skills knowledge as demonstrated in classrooms as well as on pre-and post-assessments. "One student, for example, might really excel when it comes to telling time, but struggle with problem solving. The student is able to participate in a group that matches their readiness level for each concept area," explained Mrs. Weiler.

By providing this type of fluidity, student learning is fine-tuned according to student needs, growth, and comfort level. Teachers are better able to instruct to student needs, because they are instructing to fewer levels of variability in a given lesson, (2-3 math skill levels instead of 6-8). With three groups of focused instruction, students are able to shine in classrooms when they otherwise may have been intimidated by faster or more vocal student peers. Mrs. Cummings affirmed they all have "seen a lot of improvement in the students' math confidence and leadership skills across all levels. The kids have enthusiastically increased their speed and accuracy in standard math drills."

What does this look like in Tullar classrooms? Students participate in many different groups based on their readiness levels in math concept areas. Pre-assessments are given in each concept area to determine prior independent knowledge and skills. Using the information gathered from the pre-assessments, Mrs. Michalkiewicz, Mrs. Cummings, and Mrs. Weiler, in partnership with Mrs. Vosters, plan and deliver instruction that specifically targets student readiness in the given concept area. Upon completion of each unit, student growth is measured through post-assessments.

Students enjoy the interactivity and flexible grouping, as their math peers change in every unit. Additionally, they have the opportunity to work with all three second grade teachers. Second grade student Landon loves the flexibilty, "We get to work with friends from other classes - that's cool!" Jazzmyn is thrilled "that we get to choose from so many puzzles and games!"

Principal Galow is "proud and thankful our dedicated teachers ensure all students receive a strong foundation for learning concepts. They also understand that some students need to be challenged in certain units. We appreciate their hard work to ensure that all students are reaching their maximum potential."
