NJSD Receives Platinum Level National Well Workplace Award

The Neenah Joint School District's emphasis on employee wellness has resulted in it being named one of five platinum level Well Workplace Award winners nationwide for 2021 by the Wellness Council of America. The platinum level is the highest level bestowed by the organization.



Platinum Level Well Workplaces have distinguished themselves as not only leaders but innovators in workplace health promotion. The Well Workplace Awards initiative is driven by a rigorous set of criteria to a result-oriented Well Workplace. Since its inception in 1991, over 1,000 organizations, ranging

from educational institutions to non-profit and profit sectors have joined the list of "America's Healthiest Companies" by receiving the Well Workplace Award.


The District's three wellness goals are to foster a healthy organizational culture, ensure a healthy workplace environment and support employee health and wellness. In recent years, the District has offered an on-site health and wellness clinic with on-site flu and COVID vaccinations, wellness hours on Professional Learning Days and employee fitness and health challenges. The District has provided numerous monthly wellness programs and events that focus on both physical and mental stress such as meditations, workout classes, healthy cooking demonstrations and nutrition and financial well-being courses.

The wellness program is led by District Wellness Coordinator Jessica Lehman as well as over 20 volunteer wellness champions spread throughout each building in the District. Neenah was also honored with an award in 2013 at the gold level.

Neenah was the only school district among the five platinum winners. Others were Verve Credit Union in Oshkosh, Exact Sciences Corporation in Madison, Drexel University in Philadelphia and Higginbotham Insurance in Fort Worth, Texas. Wisconsin Rapids School District was a silver level recipient and Neosho School District in Missouri was a bronze level winner.

Over the past four years, 13 Wisconsin organizations have received the platinum designation. Neenah is the only school district among the state's platinum recipients.

Neenah students returned to school for in person learning on Sept. 1. The District adopted a "COVID Recovery Plan" aimed at keeping students in school.



The plan includes COVID testing that is being conducted by an outside company for District students and staff. When students or staff members are showing symptoms or identified as close contacts, they are able to schedule a rapid (antigen) and PCR test at the high school to determine whether they will be able to remain at school.



Future Neenah High School students were the first to put shovels into the ground for their new school on June 10 during the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Neenah High School that will open in the fall of 2023. From the Superintendent



The value of in-person learning simply can't be overstated!

After a year where about one-fifth of our students were engaged in virtual learning for an entire school year and many others were in and out of school throughout the school year, we are so excited to have every one of our

students back in front of teachers this year. With many of our staff members and even some of our older students now vaccinated, we are hopeful and confident that our schools will remain open throughout the 2021-22 school year.

Prior to opening our doors on September 1, we surveyed our elementary families and as a result, decided not to offer a virtual option. Having interpersonal relationships with peers and adults is a significant part of the educational experience and just can't be replicated virtually. The mental health of our students was also challenged during the past year for those who were unable to interact with their friends and teachers on a daily basis.

We saw that impact firsthand during the final few months of the most recent school year. While we were proud to be able to offer an in-person experience for most of the 2020-21 school year, we had very few incidents of schools or classes moving to virtual learning from March through May. The strides our students made with a consistent in-person environment in academic success and personal relationships were profound.

In order to maintain this in-person learning environment, we have taken some measures to ensure that our students and staff are safe and healthy. We are especially proud to offer on-site daily testing for students and staff as well as the two vaccination clinics we had over the summer. In just the first few weeks of this school year, these testing procedures have already significantly reduced guarantines and missed class time for both students and staff.

School is certainly different than it was just two years ago, but the differences aren't as substantial as many might think. In the end, teachers are with students and children are with their friends. It doesn't get much better than that.

Nine Schools Honored for Positive Behaviors

schools have been rewarded for their work with developing positive behaviors in schools during 2020-21 by the Wisconsin Response to Intervention Center. All nine schools are receiving the award

for the third straight time after they were presented in not 2019-20.

Clayton, Hoover, Lakeview and Wilson Elementary Schools were all honored for the fifth time and earned Silver Level distinction. Shattuck Middle School, Taft and Tullar Elementary Schools were chosen for the fourth

straight time and received Bronze Level awards, while Horace Mann Middle School and Spring Road Elementary were selected for the third straight time at the Bronze Level.

The schools received the recognition for their work accomplished through the implementation of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS).

All NJSD Students Eligible for Free Meals

Neenah Joint School District students will not be charged for school meals throughout the entire 2021-22 school year through a federally-funded waiver program.

All students are eligible for free breakfast and lunch through the continuation of the USDA's Seamless Summer Option program. A la carte items and additional milk items will be charged a fee.

The Board of Education approved an Asbestos Management plan in accordance with the Federal Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA). A copy of the District-wide plan is on file at the Administration Building, 410 South Commercial Street. Inquiries about a building's plan should be directed either to the building principal or to the school secretary. Asbestos management activities which occurred over the past 12 months include, but are not limited to, the following: 1) the required 6-month inspections; and 2) ongoing operations and maintenance projects done as necessary by certified personnel.



Open Hearts, Open Minds Over 1,000 Neenah High School Students Collaborate on Mural

Over 1,000 Neenah High School students collaborated on a sculptural mural that will reside in the school hallways and be a part of the new high school when it opens in 2023.

The project was planned by art students and completed with the assistance of artist-in-residence Connie Greany of Legacy Murals. Students in the school's art classes and advisory classes all contributed to the project that was coordinated by teacher Lisa Dorschner. Each student was given a clay medal-



lion to inscribe with drawings or positive messages for the mural. The completed medallions were glazed by art students and glued to the mural. Over half of the school's 2,000 student enrollment participated in the project. Students and staff were surveyed last fall to help determine the content of the mural and the work took place



For the second straight year, Neenah High School held a parade for graduating seniors on the morning of graduation day. Students donned their caps and gowns and rode around the high school neighborhood and Memorial Park.

during the spring semester.

The design theme is "Open Hearts, Open Minds" to signify the many ways students care for one another as they strive to grow during their high school years. It promotes the wellness and mental health of the school community and highlights the "Sources of Strength" program that focuses on youth mental health. One side features hands and hearts reaching for the Sources of Strength logo, while the other side features a Fibonacci spiral in reference to the harmonious mathematical sequence seen throughout science, nature and space. The mural

also has a sculptural shape with a planter on top.

District technology education teacher Dean Olkowski built the framework that is designed to be moved when the school relocates to a new facility in two years. The project was funded by a grant from the District's PBnJ mental health fund.

Three Neenah High School seniors have been named semifinalists for the prestigious National Merit Scholarship Program.

Andrew Hou (*pictured*, *top left*), Ethan Hou (*right*) and Caleb Youngwerth (*bottom left*) were honored for their performance among than 1.5 million students nationwide who

entered the 2022 competition by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

Andrew and Ethan Hou are the sons of Yanming Hou and Jie Zhou. Both students posted perfect 36 scores on their ACT exams last year and both are involved in soccer and orchestra. Andrew has a 3.98 grade point average



and Ethan owns a 4.0 grade point average.

Youngwerth is the son of James and Jennifer Youngwerth. He scored a 35 on his ACT exam last year and owns a 4.0 grade point average. He was a state qualifier in swimming last winter and is a member of the marching band. Youngwerth served on the subcommittee to help develop plans for the

performing arts areas of the new Neenah High School.

Sounds of Music Return in 2021-22

Music and drama events are back on this year across the District as the public will be welcome to attend any concerts or events. Last year, most concerts were cancelled. A musical was held in the spring and the show choir held its annual "Finale" for a limited audience.

The 2021-22 fine arts season began in late September with five shows of the musical *Legally Blonde*. The marching band has also



performed at home football games and both the Shattuck and high school bands took part in the annual homecoming parade.

Choir and orchestra concerts will also be held and most of the elementary schools are scheduled to hold their winter concerts in December.

Girls Tennis Looks to Build On State Runner-up Finish With New Coach

Neenah High School's girls tennis team has been the top-ranked team in the state for much of the 2021 fall season after a state runner-up finish during its spring season last May.

The Rockets are also under new leadership as longtime Neenah resident and former college tennis standout, Dan Grassl has taken

over as head coach.

Grassl has lived in Neenah for 20 years and been active in the city's youth sports programs. Grassl played four seasons at Michigan Tech University from 1996-99 and ranks sixth in school his-



tory in career singles wins and fifth in career doubles victories.

The Rockets went 16-1 during the WIAA alternate spring season in 2020-21, suffering their only loss in the state championship match 4-3 to Middleton in May. Additionally, Sophia Paape and Shelby Roth became the ninth Neenah tandem to capture a state doubles championship.

Grassl replaces Kyle Falk, who resigned at the end of the season and will continue as Neenah's head boys' tennis coach. This fall, the girls team won its ninth consecutive Fox Valley Association championship and extended its winning streak against conference opponents to 82 straight.



The Spring Road Elementary School playground now features a "Communication Board" to assist students at the school who are non-verbal. What's Happening

• Crews have been using dynamite to pulverize the bedrock, which allows them to pour footings (the base of the building) and gain access for installing utilities in the site.

 In early October, crews will begin drilling geothermal wells which will contain underground loops of pipe that will move liquid for heating and cooling. When the weather is cool, the liquid heats up to bring heat into the building. The system runs in reverse when the weather is warm, bringing cool air into the school and saving significant costs and fossil fuel use.

• Over 400,000 yards of dirt has been removed and 300 yards of concrete has been poured. A retention pond was also built on the southeast side of the property..


