A Reflection from Sae as she transitions to NHS...

Just a week ago, I was invited to be a guest speaker for all the U.S. History sections at the high school. The goal of my presentation was to inform students about historical events that led to hardships and successes of the Hmong people, with a strong emphasis on the Secret War and Vietnam War. At the end of the presentation a student asked, "How have all of these events and experiences help shape who you are as a person and what you do in your role as the Equity and Inclusion Coordinator?"

Wow, I was not prepared to answer that question. To be quite honest, I was so blown away by this students' question, that I can't even remember what my response was. I've had some time to really reflect on the question though and here is what I have to say...

When we have a strong sense of who we are and what our values are, our actions will reflect that. This includes how we show up for work every day and who we are showing up for. It shows up in the way we interact with one another and also challenge one another. Perhaps where it shows up the most is when we are at our most vulnerable state and we are feeling defeated. How we respond to that is who we are as individuals. I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to bring my lived experiences with me to Neenah and to be able to rumble with vulnerability and courage.

If you were at the 2021-2022 August Convocation, I hope you still can recall some parts of the speech I gave. I often come back to those examples of how I had 'champions' in my life who didn't see the deficits that I had, but instead instilled hope and a better future by seeing the strengths in me. We have students each and every single day needing a champion in their life. **Who has been your champion this year? Who have you been a champion for?**


